It is with great pride but also sadness that the RAPID-CTCA trial has come to the end of recruitment after 4 years. This multi-centre randomised controlled trial looking at the use of early CT Coronary Angiogram (CTCA) in patients with suspected or confirmed ACS across 37 UK hospitals has been rewarding and challenging and has been a great opportunity to strengthen EMERGE's collaborations with other ED research teams as well as cardiology and radiology colleagues. It will also be the largest trial in CTCA in this patient group ever so

an amazing achievement.



In total, the trial has screened 12,740 numbers of patients and recruited 1749 participants and allowed Rachel and Alasdair as well as Kat, the trial manager, to travel to many places in the UK covering over 20000 miles to meet all the researchers taking part. In total we believe over 750 people have been involved across all the sites.

Thank you to everyone who has participated in the trial, most importantly all the participants who took part and made it possible.

Study Update- ETNA

ETNA aims to find out whether an MRI scan completed as soon as possible after symptoms present, lead to a better diagnosis than standard care. Once the patient has been discharged, following being discharged, the participant completes a questionnaire 90 days after to evaluate their quality of life.

So far we have had 97 out of 142 patients complete their questionnaires which is a

68% success rate!

Phase 2 of BRAINED will be coming soon!

BRAINED is a research project looking at creating a novel biomarker to detect brain tumours.

This study has been recruiting at the Western General Hospital, but in the next phase of this project, the recruitment areas will expand to the Emergency Department in the Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh.

400 participants have been recruited so far and the aim is to extend this to 1000 with recruitment kicking off at the Royal in August.

EMERGE are excited have started this project as the first one in our new journey with neurosurgery research.
